### **New BHS Acquisition**

Your society has acquired an important new acquisition for its permanent collection, the 130-year old, metal school bell that used to call kids to class in the former District 11 schoolhouse in Belgrade Lakes (Photo 1). We are extremely grateful to BHS member Joan (Wadleigh) Megill for recognizing the historical significance of this bell, which she kept safe from the elements after acquiring it years ago. Now, she has donated the bell to the BHS so that current and future generations can have the opportunity to view this unique artifact. Thank you, Joan Megill!



Our society is confident that the bell arrived in Belgrade in 1887, because that date is engraved into the top rim of the 17-inch high bell. Next to the date is inscribed 'C. M. Pray.' We believe that is Charles Melvin Pray (1835-1904), who lived with his wife, Czrina (Simpson) Pray (1837-1922), on a farm at the corner of East and Point roads (Point Road was known as Lord

Road during the 19<sup>th</sup> century and well into the 20<sup>th</sup> century). We do not have any information as to why his name is engraved into the bell (Photo 2). Was C. M. Pray the benefactor who donated the bell? Did he forge the bell? Or was he a Superintendent for the Belgrade schools at the time or even chair of the Select Board? Hopefully, one of our members may be able to help us fill in the historical record on this detail.

The old District 11 schoolhouse was a one-room building located on Main Street at the southern end of the village, known as Belgrade Mills prior to 1900. Right across the street from the school, the West Road merged into Main Street. The BHS photo archive has a 1916 picture of that school, and one can see the bell in a small cupola that sets on the roof (Photo 3). In 1928, the town decided to build a new, two-room schoolhouse for District 11. The site chosen was behind the old schoolhouse on what became School Street. The old school house was sold to the American Legion, which did not tear down the building, but remodeled it by adding a second floor and a small

who attended the school later, in the 1950s, added some

interesting—and fun—details about ringing the bell:

extension at the rear. That building still exists, but now is occupied by Dockside Physical Therapy and The Print Shop (Photo 4).

The bell went to the new schoolhouse, which opened in 1929 (Photo 5). It continued to operate for

the next 40

years. The new school was for grades K-5, and older kids went by bus to the Central School in Belgrade Depot. Our benefactor, Joan Megill, recalls seeing and hearing the bell when she attended the new District 11 School in the 1940s. BHS member Rodney Johnson,

I remember ringing the bell daily as I went to school there from K thru 5<sup>th</sup> grade. ... Kids took turns ringing the bell in the morning, at recess and when the school was out in the afternoon. The rope for [the bell] hung in the hallway just inside the front door ... When kids were taking turns ringing the bell, some of the boys got over exuberant and "rode the rope" up and down. It always ended up with the teacher balling them out and threatening them never to do that again or else a paddling would ensue!! The teachers there during my tenure were Harold Stevens, Bee Stevens and Vera Fuller.

After the school closed in 1969, the building eventually was renovated to become Belgrade's first Regional Health Center. The bell remained over the front door, but several years later, it was removed when the entrance was changed to be on the side of the building. The building now is a

private home.

As you can tell by reading the research that Eric has done, the history of the bell is vague. There are many questions that we would like to answer.
