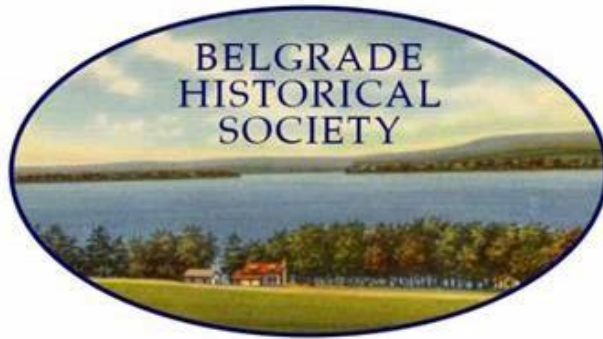

The Belgrade Historical Society is pleased to announce a major donation to our capital campaign for renovating Belgrade's historic, but deteriorating, Old Town House, adjacent to Woodside Cemetery—the town's original 'burying ground—on Rt. 135. The notice for this generous gift from Hammond Lumber Company came with the following note:

Hammond Lumber Company values our community and honors the spirit of making this a great building for the historical society. They are donating \$10,000 toward the project and are also committing to work with their vendors and manufacturers to procure discounted materials.

BHS sincerely appreciates this generous gift, which pushes total contributions for the Town House renovation project over \$75,000. We have made great progress since inaugurating our fund-raising campaign in June, and we appreciate every single donation!

The Hammond Lumber Company is Belgrade's most famous business. But how many people know that family has been an integral part of Belgrade for over 150 years. Abner Hammond (1819-1893) was born on his family's farm in Sidney, but he moved to Belgrade Depot in 1867 with his wife and two sons. According to J. Clair Minot's "Town of Belgrade" chapter in the 1892 *Illustrated History of Kennebec County, Maine, 1625-1977-1892*, Abner Hammond bought from Charles W. Stuart (1825-1895) the large store, which he owned in the Depot near the train station; Hammond then re-opened the store in January 1868 as A. Hammond and Sons (p. 1013). Abner Hammond's oldest son, Paul Hammond, was the grandfather of Clifton "Skip" Hammond, and it is with Skip Hammond that the origins of Hammond Lumber begin.

The pictures below and their captions are from p. 34 of *Town of Belgrade, Past and Present: Pictures, Places, People*, published in 1996 to commemorate the 200th anniversary of Belgrade's incorporation as a town:

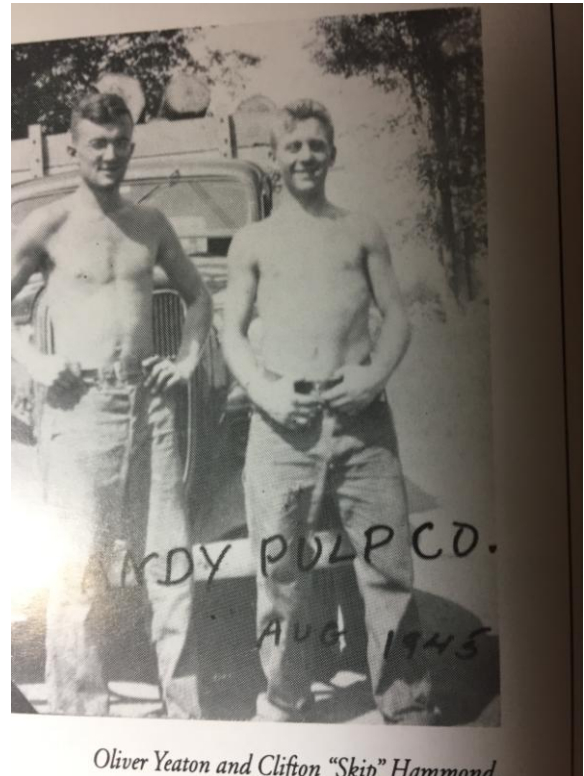


Skip Hammond with The Handy Pulp Company team of horses.

This was the start of Hammond Lumber Company! The two enterprising were Oliver Yeaton, on the left, and Clifton "Skip" Hammond, on the right. They were making a little money while in high school.

Here is the historical paragraph, also on p. 34 in the above-cited book,

"Little wonder that these lumbermen are taking a break! They've already put in a hard day's work as students at Belgrade High School. Their company, 'HandY Pulp Company,' with its total inventory, total equipment and total personnel is shown in the above photograph. Each afternoon they could be found at the wood lot off the Dunn Road. The "H" in HandY is for Hammond, Clifton (Skip) that is and the "Y" is for Yeaton, Oliver (Ollie) that is.



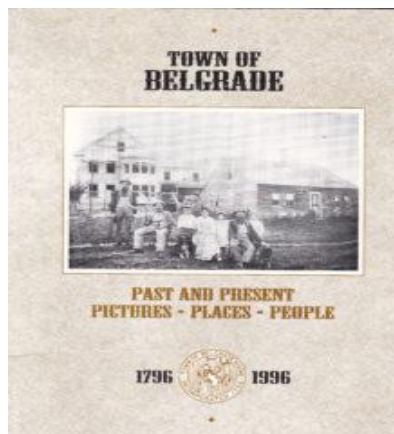
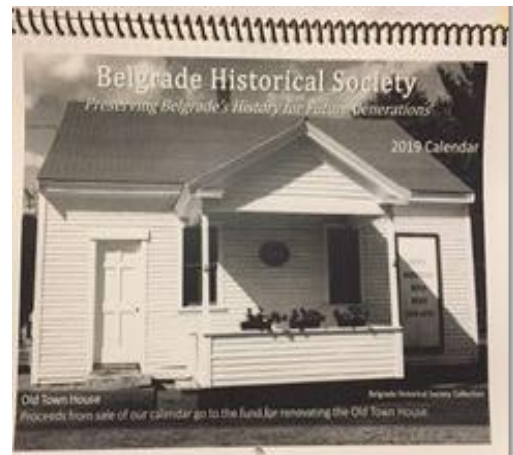
Oliver Yeaton and Clifton "Skip" Hammond

After High School [they both graduated from Belgrade High School in 1945], Ollie went on to the University of Maine where he prepared for his life's work in technology and sales with the Du Pont Company in Delaware. [The rest of the text explains how Skip Hammond went on to develop Hammond Lumber Company in the 1950s and 1960s, but that takes us out of the realm of history and into the present! Members who own the book or want to buy the reprint edition, which BHS is selling for \$30, are encouraged to read about the present on their own.]

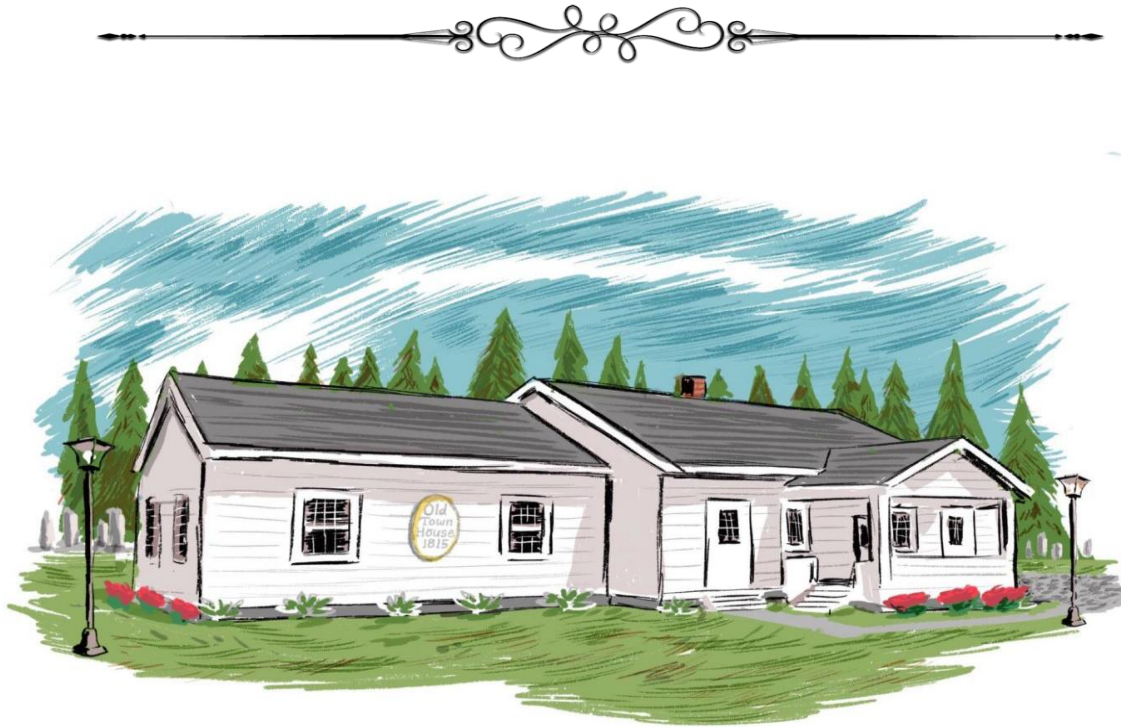
